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ADVENTIST CHURCH MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (ACMS)



Adventist church management system was first introduced in South America by few conferences twenty years ago. The General conference soon recognized it to be a powerful tool in church management. It is a digital system software that manage the church membership, local church treasury including online giving receipting, keeping of workers' service records etc.

In the Seventh-day Adventist (SDA) Church, the Adventist Church Management System (ACMS) is an administrative software used for managing church membership, finances, and reporting. It is a web-based system that allows authorized users to manage members data, track financial transactions, and generate reports.

For the Northeast India Union field, training was conducted at Shillong on March 27 & 28, 2025. During these two days executive secretaries of all units together with their administrative secretaries attended the training. We were able to learn only one part of this management, that is the church Membership management where this particular software manages in storing membership details, such as name, date of birth, place, dedication, baptism, marriage, work, profession, contact number, emails, address, record of death etc.



This system management also provide facility for transferring or receiving membership within the country or receiving or transferring members abroad. It also helps in checking if a member has multiple membership record.

Everyone in the training were excited about this system.Right now, every unit is working hard adopting and implementing it, and we are glad to mention that Mizo conference had even called local church secretaries from various church within the conference and conducted the same training.

We convey our gratefulness to pastor Mohan Bhatti, from the Division, Tiago Moises, and Wellington Junior from the General Conference.

HELPING HANDS, HOPEFUL HEARTS



K. Laitui: Reaching New Territories on April 18, 2025

The second health camp ventured into K. Laitui, Saikul—an area without an established Adventist presence. This outreach was made possible through collaboration with the South Circle of SDA workers led by Madam Thethiem Haokip.

Despite being in new territory, the camp was well-received, with 105 patients attending and receiving free medical consultations and medications. The LHM team was greatly strengthened by the presence of Dr. Soreingam Ragui, whose medical expertise proved invaluable throughout the camp. Pastor Kaisoun Gangte and other evangelists continued the practice of praying for each patient, reinforcing the connection between physical healing and spiritual well-being.

Recognizing the specific needs of the community, the LHM team conducted a targeted health talk for the village youth on the "Harmful Use of Tobacco and Alcohol." This educational component addressed pressing health concerns in the region while equipping young people with information to make healthier life choices.

"Entering a community where our message is new presents unique opportunities," shared one team member. "We found the people of K. Laitui extraordinarily receptive both to healthcare services and to the spiritual dimension of our work."

Ngamkhu Village: Combining Health and Hope, April 2025

The quarter's final health camp took place at Ngamkhu Village, Chandel, in collaboration with workers and members of the South East Circle of SDA. This camp was strategically integrated as the culminating event of an evangelistic series titled "Happy Living Gospel cum Health Camp," bringing the Adventist message to an area where it had not previously reached. Once again, Dr. Soreingam Ragui's continued support and medical expertise was instrumental to the success of this outreach effort.

Before medical consultations began, the team presented a health awareness talk on the "Harmful Use of Tobacco and Alcohol," addressing substances that significantly impact community health. This educational component laid the groundwork for the health services that followed.

The medical team attended to 87 patients during this camp, providing free consultations, medications, and spiritual support through prayer from the accompanying pastors. The integration of the health camp with the evangelistic meetings created a powerful demonstration of whole-person care.

Impact and Outcomes

In just one quarter, Lighthouse Health Ministry has:

Provided free healthcare services to 302 patients across three communities.

- \checkmark Distributed essential medications at no cost to patients.
- ✓Delivered targeted health education on natural remedies and substance abuse prevention.
- \checkmark Extended spiritual support through prayer and counselling.
- \checkmark Forged new relationships in previously unreached communities.
- ✓ Supported local Adventist members in their community outreach efforts.

Looking Forward

As Lighthouse Health Ministry continues its mission through 2025, plans are underway for additional health camps in other underserved areas. The organization remains committed to its three-fold approach: providing immediate medical care, equipping communities with health knowledge, and offering spiritual support.

"These first-quarter camps have reinforced our belief in the effectiveness of this integrated approach," says the LHM Chairman.

"When physical healing is combined with education and spiritual care, we see transformative results that extend far beyond the day of the camp itself."

3.Peanut butter (1 tbsp = 4 g protein)

In addition to protein, this versatile spread also provides niacin and magnesium for an energy boost. There are a range of peanut butters to choose from to suit your own tastes and needs, including natural and no added sugar or salt varieties.

4.Peas (1 cup cooked = 8 g protein)

Like all legumes, peas are a protein hero. These little balls of health also boast fiber for gut health, vitamin C for immunity, and vitamin K, which helps your blood clot.





5. Quinoa (1/2 cup cooked = 4 g protein)

Quinoa is not only a delicious glutenfree grain, but it is also a source of all nine essential amino acids, iron, folate, and magnesium. It is a very versatile grain—try using it in baking or making it into a delicious breakfast pudding.
